School Board President's Letter

Season's Greetings from your School Board!
Heidi, Jamie, Dillon, and I attended the Alaska
School Board Association's Annual Conference in
early November. It is always beneficial to connect
with board members from other districts and find
out how they are addressing the challenges they
face, most of which are the same as ours are in
Hoonah. We attended sessions on subjects that
ranged from how to advocate for education with
State legislators to finding alternative ways to
approach student instruction.

On December 12th the board held a budget workshop, and then we met in a joint session on the 13th with the City Council in order to discuss the district's financial situation. In both sessions, the board looked at both this school year's budget (FY17) and next year's (FY18).

Due to a range of circumstances, which include the gradual erosion of State funding for education, the school district faces a serious budget shortfall both this year and next. We will be discussing ways to reduce our expenses in order to balance our budget. We will face some very difficult decisions and we welcome cost-saving ideas from the public. During all of our deliberations, please rest assured that the board's primary goal is to avoid impacting student instruction.

When speaking of cost-saving measures, it is important to note that because of the 1% special sales tax provided by the community, our student activities will not be reduced. Thank you, Hoonah!

HCS Cultural Leadership Culture Camp Held in the Xunaa Shuká Hít

The Cultural Leadership Club envisioned a culture camp as a goal during their attendance at the 2015 Elders and Youth Conference, hosted by First Alaskans Institute and held along with the Annual Federation of Natives (AFN). Participants wanted an opportunity to gather with elders to learn Tlingit history and stories and a time to practice Tlingit crafts and language. During club meetings, students unanimously chose the

Xunaa Shuká Hít as the perfect location to hold such a gathering.



With the agenda and location chosen by the youth, Club Advisor Amelia Wilson reached out to the Glacier Bay National Park Service and Hoonah Indian Association. Mary Beth Moss, NPS Cultural Anthropologist, Darlene See, HIA Tribal House Coordinator and Ralph Watkins, HCS Principal were instrumental

in the planning. With the support of Philip Hooge, GBNP Superintendent and generous financial support from Huna Heritage Foundation, the students' vision became a reality. On December 19, 2016, the HCS Cultural Leadership Club were the first to make use of the Tribal House in Glacier Bay since its dedication in August.

Student participants included Randy Roberts, Treston Lafferty, Eddie Williams, IV, Cecelia George, Alaska Skaflestad, Mary Jack, Valarie Williams and Sophie Henry. Invaluable time was spent with elders Ken Grant and Paul Marks, Sr. learning Tlingit protocols, history and traditions. Johanna Dybdahl taught the art of regalia making with each student able to make a small tapestry with a raven or eagle design. Darlene See showed the youth how to make roses of cedar bark. Each art piece the students created held lessons beyond the actual making of the item and presented opportunities for cultural lessons. Heather Powell enhanced the camp experience through the incorporation of Tlingit language, bringing our ancestors' voice to the homeland.

Glacier Bay National Park personnel were graciously accommodating and welcoming. Melissa Senac, Tribal House Coordinator, kindly ensured all logistics were covered and the group had all they needed. Park Planner Sara Doyle met with students to hear their thoughts and perspectives on what they envision for the Park in future years. Retired park personnel, Wayne Howell and Greg Streveler, came to visit the students and brought full



circle the understanding of past relationships, partnerships and advocacy that brought us to where we are today. Stories of Hoonah elders, who were instrumental in bringing us to where we are today, were part of the amazing historical accounts shared. Tlingit song and dance completed the visit with our guests and were part of our three-day gathering in Glacier Bay.

The Cultural Leadership Club is open to all HCS high school students and aims to provide students the opportunity to gather and celebrate their culture and traditions. A foundational club goal is to provide its members with opportunities to become better enlightened in Tlingit culture as well as opportunities to gather and learn with students of the same cultural interests. It is the desire of the club to host a culture camp every year, ultimately branching out to invite other communities to join us. Our first camp held in the Xunaa Shuká Hít has built a solid foundation to build upon for all future gatherings. Our youth are truly amazing.

To complete the trip to the homeland, the Cultural Leadership Club returned to Hoonah by boat, aboard the Three Wolves Charter which made singing and dancing our way back the perfect ending to an amazing trip. The vision of these youth is supported by the Hoonah City Schools, Hoonah Indian Association, Huna Heritage Foundation and Glacier Bay National Park. It is through working together that opportunities like this camp are made possible. Aatlein Gunalchéesh to our youth and to all who support them.

Highlights from Tlingit Language Classes (see numbered photos): K-1 Classes have

been having fun making short videos and taking photos as we learn more Tlingit words and phrases; two new topics have been eating utensils and winter clothes.(1) These students got to take home *Wáa Sá <u>K</u>uwatee?* (How's the

Weather?) coloring books over the vacation, with the instructions to teach the weather phrases to other family members.



Students in grades 2 through 6 have continued to

add to their Tlingit vocabulary with drills, practice and games. A popular game this past quarter has been Balloon Volleyball; the main rule is that every time you hit the balloon, you have to say a Tlingit vocabulary word.



All of the Tlingit classes sang Christmas songs leading up to the holiday. Some went to the Senior Center to sing (2); the elementary





reviewed their standard Tlingit Christmas songs, including *Sindi Tlaas Yaa Aandéi Kawagoot.* while the high school students learned to sing *Silent Night* in Tlingit. All of the students sang together at the Community Tree Program on Christmas Eve.

The high school classes also made teabags with s'ikshaldéen (Hudson Bay Tea) that were given to elders as gifts (3); included with this gift were pieces of handmade paper. The older students got to pick out books at the Book Fair to present to the younger kids as Christmas gifts (4). They also went to Headstart and worked with them on singing and dancing (5).

Hoonah Robotics Achieves 6th place out of 11 Teams at the Region V Qualifying Tournament at Thunder Mountain High School.

An open letter to the Hoonah Robotics team "Error: 404",

Thinking back on the Region V Robotics Tournament, I am amazed. None of you had ever been to a high school robotics tournament, so all you had to work from were my wordy descriptions and pictures. Heck, all but two of you aren't even in high school yet, but you were matched against older, more experienced, and larger teams. Working entirely after school on your own time, you went up against the 11 toughest teams in Region V and earned 6th place, were chosen by Sitka High School as Alliance partners, made it into the semi-finals, and in your last game fell short by 5 points which would have earned you a spot at the State Championship.

The judges singled you out with an honorable mention for the Think Award – they loved how your engineering journal demonstrated a clear understanding of the engineering design process, recounted your team's journey, experience and lessons learned, and described the underlying science, math, and game strategies. But your journal also had a fatal flaw that disqualified you from the award (I'm trying to figure that one out now).

- Robert, you were the only veteran from last year's robotics class. You brought that experience into the team mix as you patiently described to others what needed to be done and how to do it.
- Treston, you started with programming because of your natural talent with math, but by the end of the season you wanted to do it all from building to driving – your appetite for new learning is inspiring.
- Ethan, as the team's chief 'out-of-the-box' thinker, you injected imagination and creativity into the logic of programming and the

mechanics of building, along with a helping of your special humor. Our robot would have been far more ordinary without you.

- Dakota, the team's journalist, I love how the journal reflected your awesome creativity and drawing abilities; it is through you that the judges gave us an honorable mention. (And at the end of practice how you would always pack a peanut butter and jelly sandwich for the road.)
- Xaviery, just when the rest of us were out of ideas needed to solve a problem, you came up with some new ones. Keep it up, the team needs you!
- Cooper, as the youngest person at the Tournament, you proved that age does not matter. You brought an 'I can do this' attitude to every building task.

I know the challenges you faced were at times intensely frustrating. The easiest path would simply have been to give up. But you stuck with it. I hope you feel good about what you accomplished, and you are full of ideas on how to do even better next year. I, for one, am full of them, starting with a whole new set of connection cables to make our robot more reliable!

I'm proud to be your coach. I think we all had great fun (I certainly did), and I hope to see you next year when we make it to the State Championship (and further). We will, won't we?

Happy Holidays! As the holidays begin, our second quarter of school is quickly coming to a close! So much has happened the past nine weeks. Our class gained new friends as we became pen pals with a fourth grade class at Auke Bay Elementary in Juneau. We are excited to continue this new friendship throughout the school year! Besides letter writing, the students learned how to write opinion papers, and created biographical poems about a soldier for Veterans Day.



This poetry writing was just the beginning of a fun poetry unit. We learned the difference between stanzas, lines and sentences in poems, and how poets use similes and metaphors to bring life and meaning to their writing.

As a culminating project, each student had to choose a fall poem to present at our Poetry Slam. The poem had to be memorized, and students were critiqued on



their posture, volume, pacing and how well they used appropriate gestures. We had a wonderful turnout at our poetry reading event, and many adults joined us in getting up to share one of their favorite poems.

In Science, we learned about

structures and adaptations of birds. Robin Hasselquist from the Forest Service spent time with our class, teaching us about these adaptations and structures. The focus was on wings, feet and beaks. A guiding question for this project was "How do internal and external structures support the survival, growth, and behavior of animals? (birds in particular) As a final project, we learned some painting techniques and painted specific adaptations of the Red-breasted Sapsucker. Some of these adaptations included the



moustache (little feathers covering the nostril), the white wing bar, and the feet.

We would like to give a sincere "Thank You!" to Robin for the time and knowledge she gave our class.

A few weeks before the holiday break, our class along with the whole elementary, began preparing a play, *A Charlie Brown Christmas*, to present for the annual winter program. A Letter to Hoonah about Thankful Thursday

Each Thursday this year we here at school stop for a moment and think about what we are thankful for and on this particular Thursday I sent this to our Superintendent...

Models, Models, and More Models

In math, the $6^{\rm th}$ graders have been learning to divide with multi-digit numbers, including decimals. We have been using several models including the area model, ration tables, long division, and partial



quotients. Partial quotients is a lot like long division, but you solve for partial products and subtract these from the dividend.


Varsity Volleyball
