

Robotics Season Wrap-up Report



What a memorable and fun 2018-2019 season this has been for the Hoonah Robotics Club. We divided into two teams this year: Mighty Mega Marshmallows (Nakima Budke, Alejandro Contreras, Alona Howland, Kaida

Irvin) and the *Space Unicorns* (Gary Glover, Izaac Jacobsen, Kelly St. Clair, Leah Moss, Leif Gray, Sarah Haube, Teddy Elliott, Teresa Lewis).

More than half of the team members started in preseason with the World of Robotics elective taught during the new Phases schedule. In the first two weeks, at 3 hours a day, the students built 6 robust robot bases, designed and

ents, programmed their robots

customized scoring attachments, programmed their robots for both autonomous and driver controlled modes, and competed in a simplified yet full-sized game. This jumpstart meant that most of the Hoonah Robotics Club had already stepped through all the milestones of an official robotics season before the season had even started!

Hoonah's preparedness from the Phases (and simply the greatness of our students when focused and enthused) meant that our teams took $1^{\rm st}$ and $2^{\rm nd}$ place at the midseason Southeast Robotics Scrimmage at Thunder Mountain HS in Juneau October 27. By mid-season our teams had



already rebuilt their robot bases and developed complex scoring attachments. None of the scoring mechanisms from any of the other southeast teams worked very well, so Hoonah also brought

flexible game strategies in both offensive and defensive game play that maximized their scoring abilities.

Back in the Phase schedule, part 2 of the World of Robotics elective, our students learned to design and edit objects on the computer and print those objects to a 3d printer during the school day. Then after school in the Hoonah Robotics Club, those same students designed or edited custom parts for the robot. Parts included gears, plates, spools, signs, mounts for batteries and electronics, and more. At the Southeast Robotics Qualifier in December our teams' robots had more 3d printed custom parts than any other team in Southeast!

Our teams were warned: when you hold 1st and 2nd place standing, you become the target of every other robotics team. By the Southeast Robotics Qualifier, our teams' robots were the best yet, but some of the other teams' robots had improved even more. The *Space Unicorns* had a good showing through the 6 qualifying matches, each time tweaking their robot for better play. They were the youngest team and in their rookie year, so they show promise for future seasons. Our *Marshmallows* were an Alliance selection for semi-finals, won the prestigious Design Award, and were the 4th team selected from southeast for the State Championship Tournament. Yahoo!



The *Marshmallows* did Hoonah proud at the Alaska State Robotics Championship in February. They persevered as a team through all the qualification matches and made their last match their highest scoring match even though their robot underperformed with a host of mechanical issues. Team *Trial and Error* from Thunder Mountain HS won State and will be advancing to the World Robotics Competition in Houston Texas in April – this is the team the *Marshmallows* beat in October! The *Marshmallows* have decided they will make it to World's next year, and since they are all 8th graders this year, they actually have 4 more years to accomplish that goal.


The Art of Observation:

Sketch Explorations in Grades Three Through Eight


Anyone can learn to draw — and use that as a tool for discovery, personal growth, and brain development. It's all about learning to focus — and observing deeply in order to see in terms of simple shapes, angles, and lights and darks. Then you just develop the skill of manipulating the tool (for example, the pencil or pen). Presto, something three dimensional appears on a flat piece of paper!




That's the core mission of Sketch Explorations: drawing to learn rather than just creating pretty pictures. As long as the sketcher learns something, the drawing is a success! These learnings are not just about the self-discipline of producing art, but also about science, geography, or whatever subject the art is incorporated into. And with repetition and focused practice, those pretty pictures *do* inevitably result.




This fall semester, the middle school Sketch Explorations elective was paired during the middle/high school phases with Renée Gray's Creative Writing elective. Divided into two groups, the fourteen students spent half of the three-hour block creative writing and the other half developing their drawing skills. On the Sketch Explorations side, the students had ninety minutes a day with the visual sides of their brains turned on, practicing all the techniques of observational sketching.



observational drawing, learning simple principles of composition. Students applied these skills to their finished story illustrations and pen and ink natural science drawings.



All this continues after school on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, thanks to the 1% Sales Tax for Student Activities. The After School Open Art Studio (open to interested students grades four through twelve) provides a relaxed setting in which to develop new art skills, use new media, and work on age-appropriate projects.



The students who signed up for the Art/Creative Writing class had an opportunity to use both the right and left side of the brain. During this class, the students learned a variety of skills to enhance their creative writing techniques. We practiced using voice, showing not telling, and painting pictures with our words; modeling of these skills came from reading short stories and looking at these skills in writing.

Each day began with free writing to get our creative juices flowing. The goal for each student was to write a







creative story that involves the details about nature they learned in Art. Ms. Harold provided opportunities to look closely at the details in nature, and then they would use those specific words and descriptions to paint pictures in their story.

Each student took their story through the complete writing process and produced a book with their art as the illustrations. The class ended with a Readers' Tea to share their stories with each other. Besides writing fiction stories, the students authored a variety of poetry.

The preschool group is learning about so many interesting topics this year and we are engaging in fun activities to broaden our understanding of these topics.


We are observing and describing the weather in English and Tlingit. We are learning the names of the seasons and how our world changes around us with each new season.

In December, just before Christmas break, we completed a unit of study about baking. With the help of Adrien, the students measured ingredients to make a tasty trail mix to bring home. We also made gingerbread people from scratch and decorated them. Thank you, Kaz, for baking the

Tlingit. We also count from the first day of the month all the way up to

the current date. Another thing we do with the calendar is find patterns in the images that are used for each month. For example,



January is T'aawá<u>k</u> Dísi (Geese Month); we had four different birds that made up our pattern: t'aawá<u>k</u> (Canada Goose), kéidladi (seagull), gáaxw (duck) and digitgiyáa (hummingbird.) **About this newsletter:** this publication is a project of the Hoonah City Schools Native Education Program. Since 1986, we have been using this as a means to inform families and the rest of the community of what is happening at school. 



Basketball has been a long-held tradition in Hoonah, and locals' love for the game continues. According to the Hoonah History Book, "The first basketball team was the Hoonah Athletic Club (H.A.C.) in 1916 and 1917. The starting five were, Frank O. Williams, Leslie Johnson, Jim McKinley, Eli Sharclane, and Jack Brown. Some of the other players were, George Carteeti, Jim Wright, and coach Albert Judson. There were no planes in those days so the team traveled by boat. It took

about two days to get to Juneau. The teams that H.A.C. played were Kake, the Kake A.N.B., Angoon,

> Juneau, Haines, and the Sitka A.N.B."
