Jeff Skaflestad, local Tlingit classical Formline artist, continues to work with students to hone their skills in the traditional art of Formline.




Elementary Tlingit Program

Our Elementary Tlingit Classroom has been a busy place over the last few months. Third & Fourth graders spent time learning kinship terms in Tlingit. For example, ax tláa - my mother, ax léelk'w - my grandparent, and du húnxw - his older brother, just to name a few. We took pictures of our immediate family members and made photo albums, labeling each picture with the corresponding Tlingit kinship term. This is a great way to start the process of putting together their introductory speeches which will be a $5^{\rm th}$ grade project for them.



In December, 2nd, 3rd and 4th grades dove into weaving on looms. They made coasters that they gifted to loved ones for Christmas. We talked about having good intentions and happy thoughts when creating art, especially when you are working on something you will be gifting to someone else. Their work was







graders with their weaving projects.

In January, we hit the ground running, learning about Elizabeth Peratrovich, the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Alaska Native Sisterhood and the work they did to fight for Native Civil Rights. 5th graders did an incredible job reenacting the 1945 Alaska Territorial Legislature and the important speech that Elizabeth Peratrovich gave to persuade legislators to pass the 1st ever Anti-Discrimination Act in the United States. Second Graders worked on a historical timeline telling the journey that led up to the passing of the Anti-Discrimination Act. Our event could not have been as successful without the

work that Huna Heritage Foundation and the Alaska Native Sisterhood Camp #12 contributed. Aatlein Gunalchéesh for all the work you put into this annual event!

News from the School Library

In January I began teaching elementary library classes during specials. I would like to share a recent activity that all the elementary students participated in.

To help celebrate Valentine's Day, all elementary students participated in *Blind Date with a*

Book during their library classes. Books were wrapped in

paper and labeled by grade level. Each student then selected a book without knowing what it was. After unwrapping their book, students were asked to write down the title and author of their book. Students then spent time looking at the pictures in their book and reading a few pages. Finally, students made a decision on



whether or not they would check out the book. The benefits of this activity are that students are introduced to new authors and they learn not to judge a book by its cover. The students really enjoyed this activity. Moving forward I will continue to have memorable experiences for our students that excite them about coming to the library. As a librarian my goal is to foster students' love of reading.

First Grade News

During February, First Grade was busy with Valentine's Day STEAM activities. The class really enjoyed salt painting. I made Valentine's Day designs on construction paper using glue and then applied salt. After the



glue had dried, the students painted over the designs with watercolors. The students were delighted to see how the paint magically traveled over the salt.

In another activity students grew crystals! Each student took a pipe cleaner and bent it into the shape of a heart. We mixed water and borax together in a cup. We dipped the heart-shaped pipe cleaners in the cups of the water/borax solution and let them set overnight. The next day students were thrilled to see they had grown crystals in the shape of a heart.



For another activity, students made predictions about how many conversation heart candies they could stack up before it would topple over. The class had fun trying to stack the most conversation hearts. They also enjoyed trying the candy when they were done stacking.

Second Grade Update

Second graders have been busy, and are learning a lot. Some of the things we have been working on are comprehension topics like main idea, details and chain of events. In math, the students have been practicing measuring. As part of their study of



measurement, they created their very own town which they named Centimeter Town (we created buildings that we measured and recorded in centimeters.)

We have also been learning how to use similes; during this unit, the students wrote poems about themselves. They have also been making huge gains in reading and we have seen many 100% scores on spelling tests. Overall, it has been a busy year in our Second



Grade class, and we are making lots of growth!

Devil's Club Harvest in 5th Grade

This past Fall, the Hoonah 5^{th} Graders spent considerable time learning about the harvesting of Devil's Club, as well as the uses and the invaluable existence in our ecosystem of this amazing plant. We decided it must be one of the most amazing plants on the planet. The Tlingit name $S'\acute{a}xt'$ was how we came to know it.

In November, we set out to harvest some stalks for ourselves and learn what we could do with it. Though it was not the best time for this, we wanted to include an entire process of harvesting and preparing this plant. We invited our local friend and volunteer Jamie Erickson and Yéilk' Vivian Mork, who was in town with the Huna Heritage Foundation. Traveling out the road, we located some late-season *S'áxt'* and harvested 30 feet of stalks. We then took this back to class and began to process, first stripping the outer bark and mincing the inner bark into little bits.



Amelia Wilson and Rebekah Sawers of Huna Heritage then came to class and helped us to soak the *S'áxt'* in olive oil, which they donated. They instructed us to let it sit for 3 to 4 months as the medicine bled out of the inner bark and into the oil. We

shook the concoction once or twice a week to expose all the pieces to the oil. We shook, and we shook, and we shook some more.

In early February, our Huna Heritage friends of class arrived again. We processed our mixture by straining and adding the oil and beeswax, provided by our Tlingit teacher Ms. Cristina Smith. This was all put into crocks and the wax was melted in. Finally, we ladled it out into small tins for the kids to take home and to give as gifts. The salve was gifted to School Board members at their February meeting, and also gifted to school volunteers.



We did not stop there though. Through this six-month-long event we also used the inner core of the $S'\acute{a}xt'$ to make beads. Students took these home. Over the course of this study, we worked on respecting this amazing plant through all the parts of our processing. We learned about using every part of the plant we could. We studied and read about $S'\acute{a}xt's$ traditional uses here in Southeast by the Tlingit people. What a great adventure we went on. None of us will ever look at $S'\acute{a}xt'$ the same.









News from Middle School ELA (English Language Arts)

We have worked on figurative language and grammar this part of the school year. We worked on this to understand creative language and to tighten up the students' spelling and grammar skills. We also read and watched a great short story, *The Secret Life of Walter Mitty.* It has been such a busy time for the Middle schoolers this year with teams and practices; it's also been a rewarding time for their instructor, watching them flex their creativity muscles. *Whitney Noble, Middle School ELA Teacher*

Sixth Grade Science





We have had an amazing second and third quarter. From understanding more about the world with our *Earth, Moon, and Stars* Unit, to our current project, 2D and 3D printing, these sixth graders show an affinity for Science and Technology.

In February, the 6th Grade class traveled to Palmer for a Benteh Stem Camp hosted by the KNIK Charter School. Our time in the facility was spent investigating areas of study in the camp, and completing a track that helped us to be better engineers. Activities included 2D printing, cybersecurity, robotics, woodworking, drones, a social media lab, and more. When we weren't actively working in the learning labs, the program hosted us on a variety of outings, including the movies, cross country skiing, and a trampoline park.



As part of HIA Environmental's efforts to provide opportunities for Hoonah students, high schoolers traveled to Sitka for WhaleFest, and to Anchorage for the Federal Subsistence Board Meetings. We are proud of them for participating and for what they accomplished!

WhaleFest

WhaleFest is a three-day Science Symposium where scientists and experts share the latest research and knowledge about marine life. Students listen to presentations, ask questions, and engage in hands-on activities as part of a class that provides college credit upon completion through the University of Alaska Southeast.





Federal Subsistence Board Meeting


The Federal Subsistence Board is made of representatives from the five land-owning federal agencies in Alaska (the National Park Service, Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Fish and Wildlife Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs) as well as six elected members of the public. Together the group makes decisions regarding subsistence harvest for both urban and rural users throughout the state, driven by guidance from regional advisory committees and public testimony from local residents.

Students had the chance to attend this year's meeting in February as part of a class given by UAS. Kyah Martin, Mitchel Michel, Cayenne Boe, Dietrich Lewis, and Hayden Daniels met

for virtual lectures after school at the Haa Toowú Latseen (Tech Center). They learned how proposals get made, how regional advisory councils operate, and who votes on the board. At the meetings, they were chaperoned by Julian, Jackson Combs, and Jamie Erickson. Students' assignments included networking with federal/state employees,

interviewing professionals, following the proposals, and providing their own testimony in front of the board about "subsistence" issues of concern to them.

Hoonah students represented the region well, being active participants and providing input when they could. It was amazing to witness them taking advantage of these educational opportunities and to engage with the wider scientific, political, and professional community. We have seen them grow exponentially through these experiences. Thank you to everyone who helped make these trips possible!

Junior Dashel Huskey, 4th place at 145.


Sophomore Tanner Howland, 2nd place at 140.

Hoonah Indian Association News

From Tribal Administrator Nathan Moulton

The staff at the Hoonah Indian Association are pleased to share some exciting information on current projects complete and close to completion. We have received news of confusion of who exactly can use these services. One point of clarification on these projects, is they were built with "community" in mind and as such these facilities and services are open and available to all community members of Hoonah.

Our **Technology Center** is now open to the public and we are offering various courses targeting all age demographics. Beginning typing, beginning computers, dual enrollment college courses, GED courses, beginning Tlingit language classes, business/non-profit formation, last wills and testaments, and we have seen several of the classes from

Hoonah City Schools utilize the space. If you'd like us to offer something specific, please let Catherine Bolton know and we will do our best to facilitate. Additionally, we are looking for motivated individuals (youth and/or adults) to submit proposals to the Tribe for additional class offerings they feel would benefit community members' digital knowledge and capabilities.

The **Childcare Center** is 95% complete, with kitchen cabinets, counter tops, appliances, and classroom casework being the only remaining items left to complete. Playground equipment was ordered on 2/20/2025 and expected completion of the playground will occur in April/May of 2025. We expect 90-180 days for licensing approval which puts us into November 2025 as the earliest dates we could potentially operate. Staffing will be our next issue to solve, and we are looking for a Childcare Administrator, Childcare Development Associates (CDA), as well as youth CDA trainees who wish to explore childcare as a career and gain college credits in the process.





The **Greenhouse and Kitchen Project** is nearing completion, and we anticipate beginning our first grow cycle in the next 1-2 months. We have had youth actively engaged at setting up hydroponic grow towers and envision continuing this youth involvement through internships and dual enrollment credit offerings. This project is another example of HIA Admin and HIA Tribal Council caring for the whole community, as food security has never been more important given the current political and economic climate. Be on the lookout for more announcements and information as we begin operations. The Grand Opening for the Greenhouse is slated for June 26, 2025.
