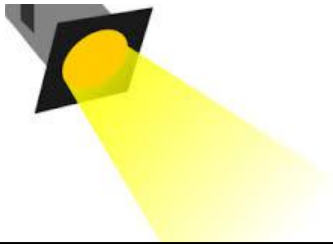

# Elementary Tlingit Class News—

In the Elementary Tlingit classes, we continue to work on developing the students' skills in Tlingit language. In Pre-K & Kindergarten, we play listening games, use pictures and cards, and sing songs to help us learn Tlingit. Sometimes we get out the Sha K'únts (Potato Heads) to play and practice talking about body parts. The First-Second Grade class and Third Grade do a daily *dis wooxéiyi* (calendar) activity where we practice counting and learn new vocabulary. In January, the vocabulary pictures were places, such as neil (home), sgóon (school) and hoon daakahídi (store.)

Back in December, the vocabulary words were taakw naa.ádi (winter clothes.) The vocabulary focus in February will be birds.

The next step will be to use cedar bark for this project. These classes are also practicing how to introduce themselves in Tlingit. In 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> Grade, we have started playing a new game: Tlingit Jeopardy!

The students were able to touch and look at different antlers and animal pelts. They really enjoyed seeing the bear skulls and hide and being able to compare the pelts of various small animals found on the island. 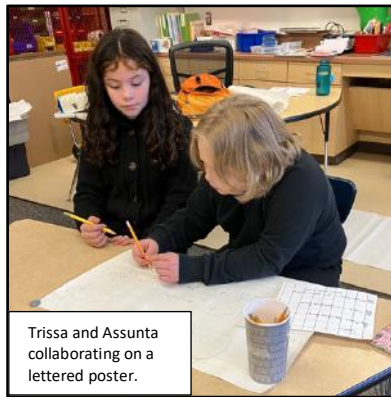
**Art Classes at Hoonah City Schools**  
**Taught by Stephanie Harold**

I have been having a great time teaching observational art in the 1<sup>st</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> grades this fall. In the Elementary grades specials classes, students have been developing their drawing skills, including how to hold their tools most effectively. In some cases, we have also been learning the Tlingit names for the plants and creatures being drawn.



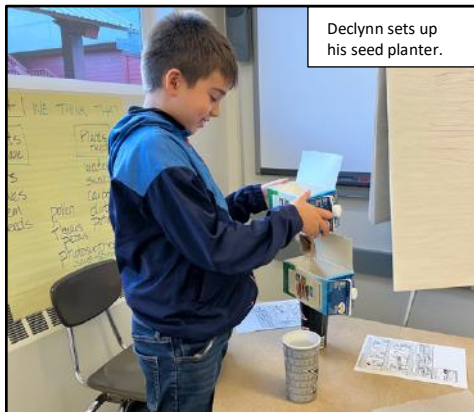

The fifth graders have been growing corn and beans from seed and documenting the growth cycle. In the process, they are learning about what plants need in order to grow and how to show the curvature of an object (ie. the stem of a plant.)

I have also been teaching a daily STEAM class for the 6<sup>th</sup> grade. Building on their plant study in the fifth grade, we began with field sketching seed pods. We then learned about lettering styles and the difference between serif, sans serif, and script hand lettering. My

goal was for each student to develop their own font style which they are now using to create personalized stickers.

Our big project has been landscape

drawing. I chose this based on a class brainstorm of what they wanted to learn to draw. We did several field trips to different locations to sketch landscapes, learning in the process about selecting a center of interest and using the rule of thirds for an interesting composition. Back in the

classroom, the students created different pen textures to represent landscape elements.

We talked about the importance of value (using lights and darks.) We also learned techniques for showing distance using color, temperature, contrast, and detail. The project required the students to persevere through their pieces even if they didn't like them at the early stages. They also had to work with the challenge of designing shapes and textures to represent what they saw in an abstract fashion.

Several students learned about effective collaboration by designing a poster showing their process and products.

Finally, I am offering a *Community Sketch Club for Relaxation and Joy*. This occurs every Tuesday evening until the end of February from 6 to 7 pm in the Elementary STEAM classroom. This is intended to encourage anyone in the community to learn observational sketching as a way to relax and appreciate the details around us. The club is open to everyone — my mantra is “no pressure, no guilt, no talent needed.” Text me at 907-988-9104 if you would like to join us.

## Hoonah Students Get Travel Opportunities with HIA

Over the past couple of months, the HIA Environmental Office has facilitated two trips to help students explore career options for after graduation—one to sunny Palm Springs for the annual meeting of American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES) and another to blustery Sitka for WhaleFest.

### AISES

Thanks to funding and coordination from Sealaska, Julian Narvaez was able to take two crew



members from this summer's AYS (Alaska Youth Stewards) crew to the 2022 AISES conference in Palm Springs, California. Susan Bradford and Theodore Elliott joined a cohort of AYS crew members from Kake, Angoon, and Prince of Wales, along with over 2,000 Indigenous high school and college students, educators, and professionals. The three-day conference focused on educational, professional, and workforce development for Indigenous peoples in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) studies and careers. Participants were able to join a variety of talks, exhibits, and activities put on by a diverse range of educational institutions, government agencies, nonprofit organizations, Tribes, corporations, and Indigenous-owned businesses.

The trip was a great opportunity for the Hoonah crew to meet and connect with peers in Southeast that they may see again if they pursue a career in STEM. It was also valuable for them to know they have the support of not only local tribal entities like HIA and Sealaska, but also the larger AISES community for scholarships, internships, advice, and networking opportunities.

### WhaleFest

The beginning of November was marked by WhaleFest, a long weekend of biology talks, lab tours and engineering workshops in Sitka. Before the conference began, the students spent a day with environmental staff from the Sitka Tribe of Alaska Environmental Research Lab (STA-ERL) learning about all the different projects to keep Southeast residents safe. They shucked shellfish, learned how to test them for the toxins that cause Paralytic Shellfish Poisoning,

harvested Hudson Bay Tea with an STA Elder and tested out the protocols for a marine debris survey.

The theme for WhaleFest this year was *How it's Made: Courting, Reproduction and Babies*, and included everything from seaweed to



jellyfish to humpback whales. The students were all particularly impressed by the talk by Desiree Jackson, a registered Dietitian based in Juneau who talked about the benefits of eating traditional foods and how eating salmon, herring eggs, seaweed and seal oil can drastically reduce the risk of diabetes and other chronic health issues. They were also all rather amused by the talk by Matt Wilson, who's in charge of Sitka Sound Science Center aquarium, on the jellyfish reproductive cycle. After each day's talks, the students participated in break-out sessions with the scientists to ask them for more information about their research and career paths. While Teresa wasn't sure whether that part, or learning about dolphins was her favorite part, she said it helped make the science feel more personal.



In the spring, HIA will be collaborating with Hoonah City Schools to welcome the inaugural class of the Rural Alaskan Students in One-Health Research (RASOR), a program designed by UAS in collaboration with tribes across the region to help students design and implement their own environmental science research projects. It's founded on a principle that Hoonah residents should all be familiar with—the idea that the oceans, the land and the people are all connected and if one branch is struggling, it will effect all three. While the team is still considering their options for projects, they're looking forward to hitting the snowy beaches and starting to get some field experience as they monitor Hoonah's natural resources and prove that science is for everyone.

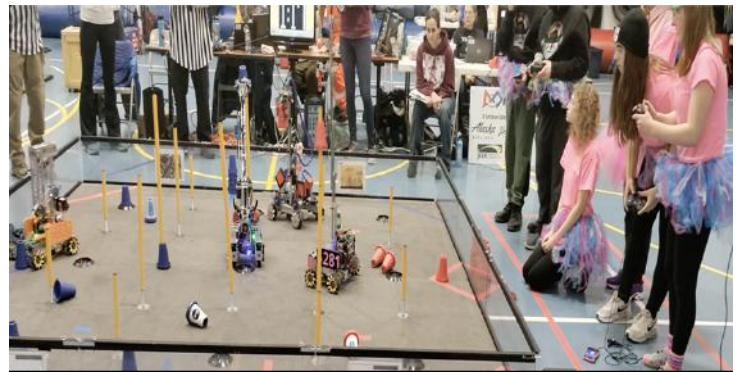
Being coachable, trying your best, and believing in yourself are also important in basketball. And most important: HAVING FUN!

At the Southeast Alaska Robotics Qualifier last December 9 – 10, *Neurolink*, Hoonah’s robotics team, faced severe robot failures but with perseverance played their way into the semi-final matches, were awarded the Robot Design Award, and earned an invitation to the Robotics Championship Tournament in Palmer this January 20 – 21.

Every robotics season comes with an all-new game the team must strategize around, design, build and code a scoring robot, and practice driving for the winning gameplay. This season’s game consists of 29 separate goals from the floor to 34 inches high and spread out over a 12 foot by 12 foot playing field! To be competitive our robot needed to be fast, highly maneuverable, and able to reach high from tight places.

Some unique features of our robot this year included:

- Mecanum wheels means our robot can drive in any direction including sideways like a crab. Bike chains and sprockets transmit the power from four 12 volt motors. Mecanum wheels were invented by the US Navy to move supplies around in the tight places found on aircraft carriers – kind of like this year’s robot game!
- A linear slide that extends from 15 inches (ca. 38 cm) to 40 inches (ca. 1 m) in seconds. It is powered by two 12v motors and two opposing spools to wind up the pulling strings.
- A 3d printed gripper that fits the scoring cones like a glove.
- Color and distance sensors for smart navigation and decoding the signal sleeves

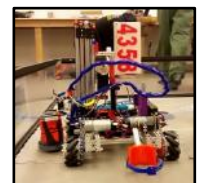
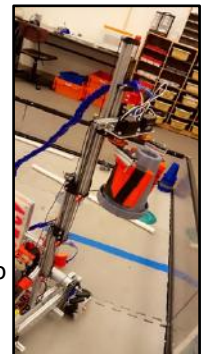
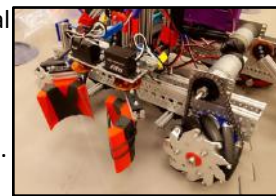
Every team member contributes in multiple ways to make the Neurolink the competitive team it has become. Dash is the main driver and co-builder of the robot.
