Hoonah Hosts Region V Qualifying Tournament and Sends Two Teams to the State Championship

It has been a busy year for robotics, first by hosting the Region V Qualifying Tournament in Hoonah with 13 robotics teams in contention and then sending two Hoonah teams to the State Robotics Championship in Anchorage!

At the Region V Qualifier in Hoonah: Our "Hoonah Tech" team earned their spot as "Host Qualifier" with their tough robot chassis, innovative scoring

attachment, and complete engineering notebook - a good all-around showing. Each qualification match pitted 4 teams paired into two competing alliances and after 17 matches, Hoonah's "Mighty Mega Marshmallows" team ranked 4th, making them Alliance Captains in the semi-finals, which they lost, but their standing earned them a spot at Championships. They also scored the 2nd highest qualification match of the day at 129 points! Despite Hoonah's "Verdure Golems" team having a robot lacking scoring attachments, they were able to rank 9th in the qualification matches due to their creative driving and strategizing. Other high schools represented included Thunder Mountain (5 teams), IDEA Homeschool - Juneau, Juneau-Douglas, Sitka and Kake (2 teams). *Robotics story continued on page 7.*

Staff Spotlight on Ms. Mimi

Dmitrieva Antal, known affectionately by her nickname Ms. Mimi, is currently the 4/5 Teacher. Her last teaching position was as the 2/3 Teacher in Gustavus. She originally came to Alaska in 1995 after having moved from her home in the San Francisco Bay Area. She lived in Fairbanks and the surrounding area for almost twenty years. While in the interior she primarily lived in the small, dog mushing community of Two Rivers. For more than eight years she lived off the grid without electricity, indoor plumbing, or most modern conveniences. What she loved most about her time there was just that - time. She would most often be found spending her time reading historical fiction, knitting and weaving, and taking care of the family's livestock. Their family raised chickens, rabbits, hogs, and milk goats. While there, she also often volunteered in her children's school. She soon recognized her calling to become a teacher and returned to college and received a BAE in Elementary Education from UAF in 2012.

In taking a look at these two new employees, we can see that they are carrying on the work their Grandmothers did in our community.



Levi Mills, the grandson of Katherine Brown Mills, will be working mostly with students in the upper grades. He will assist in classrooms to provide help as needed, and to provide a positive "Uncle" influence for our students. Levi is Wooshkeetaan from the Noow Hít (Fort House) and T'akdeintaan yádi. As many of you may remember, his grandmother Katherine was our first Tlingit Language Educator working with Hoonah City Schools.

Adrien Lee is also a new employee at our school. She is the great-granddaughter of Winnafred Smith. Winnie was not only a teacher at the Hoonah Head Start, she was also a frequent visitor to our classrooms talking with staff and students regarding Hoonah History. Adrien is helping prep for classes, assisting with Tlingit language instruction, and helping as needed in the various language and culture classes. Adrien is Chookaneidí from the Xáatl Hít (Iceberg House) and T'akdeintaan yádi. Adrien went to elementary school in Juneau, and graduated from high school in Day's Creek, Oregon in 2006.



We are fortunate to have both Levi and Adrien join our cultural education team.

A VERY SPECIAL THANK YOU

We recently had two special guest speakers in the middle school classes.

Kenneth Grant, T'akdeintaan and Kaagwaantaan yádi, visited our middle school class to talk with students about how at.óow is created. Mr. Grant talked about the design of the screen on the newly created Clan House at the Glacier Bay National Park. He explained what the artwork represents and what

lead to the creation of this cultural treasure.

As you may remember, the front screen depicts the Eagle and Raven with the Raven opening the box of knowledge and the Eagle holding our Tináa. The inside screen represents the Tlingit people and the anchor indicating that "we are here to stay." This reminds us that the Glacier Bay area is our original homeland.

Our goal with this event was to teach our future leaders the process in creating at.óow and to relate this important history for generations to come. These wonderful pieces of art were created by Gordon Greenwald, Owen James, and Herb Sheakley. Students were quite attentive to this important presentation and we appreciate Mr. Grant's taking time from his busy schedule to talk with the children.

Additionally, Herb Sheakley; Shaangukeidí and T'akdeintaan yádi, came and talked with our students about how family at.óow is created. Mr. Sheakley presented a crest from his family and talked about what it represents. This crest will one day be placed on robes for Shaangukeidí children; Treston Lafferty, Cheyanne Jack, Duane Jack, Mary Jack, and Kamari Lafferty, who are all descendants of Anita Lafferty and Ida Kadashan.

These were wonderfully timed presentations from both Mr. Grant and Mr. Sheakley, as these two men repeated words we tell our students all the time – the importance of culture, the importance of knowing who we are, the importance of respect and following our cultural values, and the importance of being a strong cultural leader one day.

Sixth graders also practice their Tlingit on iPads using Quizlet, a study program that allows them to study vocabulary, take short tests, and compete against each other. If you know a sixth grader, ask them about *Quizlet Live* or how they are doing on "Match." The students in this class are also in charge of putting up Tlingit Phrases of the Week signs around the school.

Hoonah Fire History Lesson

Students in the middle school and high school classes learned about the Hoonah Fire that occurred in 1944. The lesson includes the context of Hoonah in 1944, the impact of the fire on the community, and information about "Hoonah Heroes" who did extraordinary things to help people survive.

Quilt Raffle

Elementary students in the 2/3 grade class held a raffle; the prize was a Dr. Seuss quilt handmade by Kris Skaflestad. They raised close to \$300 which will be donated to the Playground Fund. Second/Third Grade News

Our third quarter came and went before we knew it! We began the third quarter celebrating the lives of Martin Luther King Jr. and Elizabeth Peratrovich. We are so grateful for the work they've done.

The beginning of March was the start of the annual Iditarod race. Every child in our class chose a musher and tracked their progress on the trail. We learned the history behind "The Last Great Race," and watched daily video clips of the mushers as they traversed the Iditarod trail. The daily update of the mushers was the highlight of every day! We even made homemade dog biscuits as a culminating project, and had to work with fractions to double our recipe. During this activity, we enlisted the help of the North Carolina college students. We enjoyed the time they spent in our classroom.



Mrs. Hutton came in to our class and shared her

adventures, getting to ride in Page Drobny's sled as a guest at the start of the Yukon Quest (an international dogsled race). **Anchorage:** Our Mighty Mega Marshmallows and Brave Tech teams gave Hoonah the best showing yet at a State Robotics Tournament, seeded 10th and 16th, respectfully, against 32 of the top high school teams across the state! (The top team from Southeast is Croc'em Soc'em Robots from Thunder Mountain HS, and they seeded 7th.). Both our teams built highly effective original robots that were capable of even higher scores with more driving practice and program tweaking (lessons for next year). As coach, I'm so proud of them - they did well in all aspects, they just got better and better as the tournament wore on, and they know what they need to work on for next season.

## Max The Robot Takes 1<sup>st</sup> Place at the Jr. Robotics Sumo Wrestling Tournament

*Max The Robot* took 1<sup>st</sup> place at the sumo robot wrestling tournament in a final battle with M.T.R.4 that was decided in double overtime! M.T.R.4 led the way with extensively tested coding and tricky strategies that we all thought would earn them the top prize. But in the final days Max was completely rebuilt and re-coded to do one thing well – wrestle! (PS. Max is NOT a cat anymore!)

What am I talking about? For the first time in Hoonah, 4<sup>th</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup> graders met after school every day from Feb. 21 to Mar. 15 to imagine (design), build, code and play (test) robots made from Lego bricks and programmed using either Boost! Blocks or Scratch (<http://scratch.mit.edu>). The robots were autonomous (no driver), but changes to coding could be made between trials and matches.

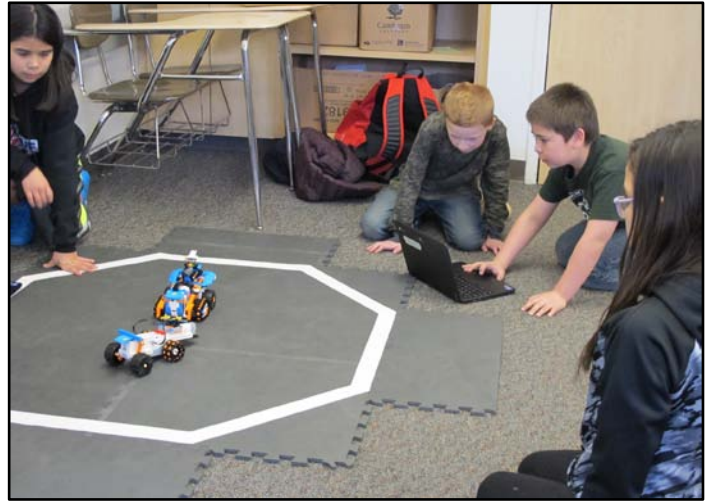

## We Can Preschool

The Preschool class is having so much fun as we continue to grow and learn. In Language and Science, we are studying the seasons and

how they affect the way we dress and what we get to do outside. In winter we learned to recognize a

variety of footprints one might find in the snow. We studied people prints, bear, bird, beaver, deer, moose, and mice prints.

We even used footprint stamps and illustrations to create our own wildlife stories. The stories included ideas such as: a guy shooting a bear, parents finding animals, and a bear finding a deer.

In Literacy, we heard stories that reinforced our monthly themes of Bears, Dinosaurs, Transportation, and Seeds and Plants. We are trying to remember the job of the author and illustrator. We are learning many new vocabulary words and notice how words and illustrations tell the story. We have been introduced to the names and sounds of eighteen letters of the alphabet. We are trying to remember them all.

In Science, we also studied beavers and their homes and we were introduced to eggs and birds. We planted bean seeds a few days ago and plan to dig one up every few days to find out how they have changed and notice what is growing out of them.

In Math, we continue to think about numbers, counting, shapes, colors and patterns. Ask your preschooler how far they can count by memory and how far they can match items one-to-one while they count. See if they notice patterns in the world around us.

We don't have much time left in the school year and there is still so much to explore and practice. We will work hard every day so we can not only be ready for kindergarten, but also to become all we are meant to be.

Thank you, parents, for having such a positive

attitude toward the Preschool, and for encouraging your children to do their best while they are here. I notice your loving care in their lives each time we are together. We have a great class and we have already learned so much!

## Greetings from PAT – Parents as Teachers!

Hoonah City Schools has PAT going again! Let's hear it for Nicki Shelton's efforts to help make this possible; HCS received a grant from DEED. PAT is an international nonprofit organization whose vision is **that all children will develop, learn, and grow to realize their full potential. We're here to provide information that supports parents' role as their child's first and most important teachers and advocates.**

Jamie Erickson is the PAT Parent Educator; she attended the PAT Foundational Training in Washington and she also worked for PAT last year. On a personal note, Jamie was willing to do all she could for her son, by fully participating in the PAT Program when he was eligible. Both Jamie and Darlene See, PAT's Manager, recently attended the S.E Alaska Association for the Education of Young Children (AEYC) Conference in Juneau. The theme was Attachment, Responsive Relationships and Resilience; it also focused on trauma (stress) and how it affects infants, young children and families, and provided tools to help make a difference.



PAT mainly focuses on personal visits. Your parent educator will provide information and an activity that is specific to one or more of the developmental domains or will focus on what the family may have concerns about. There are also group play times scheduled as well as "Baby Raven Reads".

We still have some spots open for families to enroll in PAT. We need your participation, to ensure PAT may continue to be available to Hoonah families in the future. ## Kindergarten/First Grade

The kindergarten/first grade classroom has been keeping busy this spring. The week before Spring Break, the North Carolina students came. The class had a great time interacting with them. They helped with daily activities and at the end of the week they even helped plant lima bean plants.



In Language Arts, students are taking off and doing a great job with their writing. I cannot believe the amazing growth that has happened in both reading and writing since the beginning of the year. Kindergarteners and first graders that came in just knowing some or all of their letters and sounds are now reading words, sentences and paragraphs. They are also writing words, sentences and paragraphs and doing an amazing job.

In Math, students are adding and subtracting. They know their two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes. They also know how to count in many different ways including by 1's, 2's, 5's, and 10's, all the way to 100. Some of them can even count beyond 100. They are also learning about time and money.

In Science, students are learning to survive. Soon they will plant

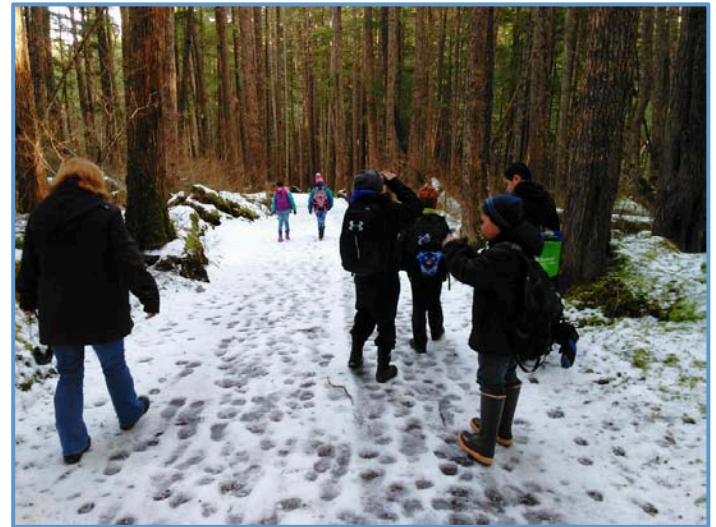


about what plants and animals need their own indoor classroom garden by using what they have already learned.
